FROM THE PASTORS DESK

We all have but one father in nature, and God's children have but "one" Heavenly Father. Our natural father knows much about us as his children, but our Heavenly Father knows everything about us. He is perfect in knowledge. The scripture says, "Are not five sparrows sold for two farthings, and not one of them is forgotten before God?" (Luke 12:6) If that is true, and it is, we are encouraged to trust the Father and not fear because "But even the very hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear not therefore: ye are of more value than many sparrows." (Luke 12:7)

Just as God the Father doesn't forget a sparrow that falls to the ground, He doesn't ever forget His children. Whereas natural parents sometimes forget their own children, our Heavenly Father never forgets the objects of His love. "Can a woman forget her sucking child, that she should not have compassion on the son of her womb? yea, they may forget, yet will I not forget thee. Behold, I have graven thee upon the palms of my hands; thy walls are continually before me." (Isa. 49:15-16) What a comfort it is to know that our Father will never leave or forsake His children!

Before we were ever conceived and born into the world, God knew us just like He knew the prophet, Jeremiah. The Bible says concerning this prophet, "Before I formed thee in the belly I knew thee; and before thou camest forth out of the womb I sanctified thee, and I ordained thee a prophet unto the nations." (Jer. 1:5) He saw our very substance before we were ever formed and wrote our names in the Lamb's book of life. "Thine eyes did see my substance, yet being unperfect; and in thy book all my members were written, which in continuance were fashioned, when as yet there was none of them." (Psalm 139:16)

Natural fathers provide for their wives and children by working in a secular job. Our Heavenly Father knows our need and provides. We all needed a Saviour to pay our sin debt which we could never pay. God provided that in His Son, Jesus Christ. When Abraham went to offer His only son, Isaac, on Mt. Moriah, God intervened. When Isaac wondered where the sacrifice was, Abraham said, "...My son, God will provide himself a lamb for a burnt offering: so they went both of them together." (Gen. 22:8) Abraham was told to not harm his son and he looked behind and behold a ram caught in the thicket by the horns. He took that ram and offered it instead of his son, Isaac.

Abraham took that ram and sacrificed it as an offering to God. "And Abraham called the name of that place Jehovahjireh: as it is said to this day, In the mount of the LORD it shall be seen." God did literally provide Himself a sacrifice to God centuries later as Jesus Christ was God manifest in the flesh. (I Tim. 3:16) One of the meanings of Jehovahjireh is Mt. Moriah and also provide. Mt. Moriah was where Abraham offered the ram sacrifice and Mt. Moriah was very close to Calvary where Jesus was crucified. God provided the need of a Saviour and the Saviour fulfilled the need by saving His people from their sins.

Natural fathers provide a home for their families to live where there is food and shelter. The Lord God not only provides for a natural home in the institution of marriage in the Garden of Eden but also has provided a church home for believers in Jesus Christ to enjoy spiritual food, fellowship, and shelter in an unfriendly world. Various things may break up a natural home, but nothing will prevail against the church which Jesus established.

God the Father has provided a Heavenly home as the final resting place of His children. Jesus told His disciples that in His Father's house were many mansions. He promised to go to the Father and come again to receive them and every other heir of promise into those many mansions. How many? As many that have been prepared and will be inhabited by all those for which Jesus died as a ransom at Calvary. "Even as the Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, and to give his life a ransom for many." (Matt. 20:28) Jesus was the firstborn among "many" brethren. (Rom. 8:29)

Jesus was the Redeemer and redeemed His people from the slave market of sin. We look forward to seeing Him some sweet day just as Job did many centuries ago. "For I know that my redeemer liveth, and that he shall stand at the latter day upon the earth: And though after my skin worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh shall I see God: Whom I shall see for myself, and mine eyes shall behold, and not another; though my reins be consumed within me." 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THE MEASURE OF

"Brethren, if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted." (Gal. 6:1)

Paul speaks many things to these Galatian brethren even before he gets to this subject of restoration of one in their ranks who has fallen in error somehow. But it is this one I feel led to write about now.

The Galatians had trouble with men coming behind Paul's ministry of grace to preach a form of the old Law and a mixture of the principles of Christ. Confusion obviously followed all of this. It is a good possibility that the individual under question here may have been a victim of this teaching. Paul desires restoration as opposed to exclusion from the fold. Also, Paul's desire would be that those who are rooted and grounded in the true teachings of Christ would point out the error to him but do it in a gentle (meek) godly caring way.

Paul instructs the sound members to "consider" themselves which means that they need to remember that they too are flesh prone to error, having a fleshy nature. They should remember to treat those in error as they themselves would want to be treated. Just as

the Savior admonishes his children to do. "Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them: for this is the law and the prophets." (Mt. 7:12)

Their efforts toward the one at fault would be for "restoring", not permanently excluding him or her from them. The word "restore" in our verse refers to a broken bone needing to be restored back to its healthy position in the skeletal body. It also shows us how important each member of our congregation is to the welfare of the church body. I mean which bone in our physical body, if it were broken, would we not want it restored back? Remembering this will help us to be gentle and loving anytime any of us need to help someone in the congregation.

"Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ." (Ga. 6:2) In this verse Paul continues his teaching by urging them to bear each others burdens when the opportunity arises. When we have something that is heavy that needs moving, we have learned that a heavy load is always lighter when we have many hands to help us lift it. Fellow members should be there for one another to help God's children to face nothing alone. Then a heavy burden is made lighter when we have many to help us. For when one of us hurt, then we all hurt. Just a kind word to let them know we are there for them will help.

"For if a man think himself to be something, when he is nothing, he deceiveth himself." (Ga. 6:3) Sadly, when a fellow member falls, sometimes we feel that we may be better than them; thinking that we would not allow ourselves to fall the same way. Maybe not, but if we think we are somehow better than those who have fallen, we are just fooling ourselves.

"But let every man prove his own work, and then shall he have rejoicing in himself alone, and not in another." (Ga. 6:4) Prove means for us to examine our own hearts and prove our own conduct in life by the rule of God's word. This is the measure that we are to use in seeing if we are doing that which is right. It is a serious error for someone to try and measure themselves against other people's perfections or imperfections, instead of the word of God. Ministers should not measure themselves against another minister or a deacon against another deacon, or churches against churches. It should all be measured by the word of God!! Any other method is error. Too often we feel we have failed because we measure ourselves against others. This method will rob us of the joy we can have when God is pleased with us, but yet we think he is not because we don't measure up to someone else we have measured ourselves against. Look to God's word and there happiness will be found.

Consider these things and may the Lord give you understanding.

(II Cor. 10:12)

"For we dare not make ourselves of the number, or compare ourselves with some that commend themselves: but they measuring themselves by themselves, and comparing themselves among themselves, are not wise."

LOVING-KINDNESS

We are taught in the word of God to be kind to each other, to love one another freely for Christ's sake. When we put these two words together, we have the loving-kindness of the Lord and where would we be if it were not for this flowing from the throne of God's grace? We would be destitute and bound for hell.

David declares why God's children should put their trust in Him. "How excellent is thy lovingkindness, O God! therefore the children of men put their trust under the shadow of thy wings." (Psalm 36:7) The lovingkindness of the Lord is excellent because His name alone is excellent (precious, valuable) and in His name is true love. When we were estranged from God and alienated by wicked works while in our natural state, we were drawn to God by a work of grace because we are incapable of recovering ourselves from death in trespasses and sins. "The LORD hath appeared of old unto me, saying, Yea, I have loved thee with an everlasting love: therefore with lovingkindness have I drawn thee." (Jer. 31:3) We do not find in God's word where the love of God had a beginning because God has no beginning. He is from everlasting to everlasting according to the Psalmist. (Psalm 90:2)

No man can come unto Christ except drawn by the Father according to the words of Jesus. (John 6:44) I have seen water drawn from a well at the house of an uncle of mine. The bucket was lowered deep into the well of water; not once did the one drawing the water ask the water to get into the bucket or if it wanted to come to the surface from the depths of the earth. NO! The bucket was lowered beneath the depths of water and literally drawn out of its environment to the surface. The Lord did not ask us if we wanted to be drawn. If He had, we would have responded with a resounding, NO! This is because we would not come to Him that we might have life. (John 5:40) Paul tells us that there is none that seeketh after God, not one!.

God draws (drags) His children from death in sin by His loving-kindness marked by irresistible grace. Paul describes how we are by nature as being foolish, disobedient, etc. until God stoops down in His mercy. "But after that the kindness and love of God our Saviour toward man appeared, Not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost;":(Tit.3:4,5)

Is it any wonder then that we would desire to put our trust under the shadow of His wings because of His loving-kindness? Without this grace we would not even desire to trust Him for our every need. Job declared that though He slay him, he would trust in Him. "Though he slay me, yet will I trust in him: but I will maintain mine own ways before him." (Job 13:15) Job obviously knew something about the lovingkindness of the Lord. We cannot glory in ourselves or even glory in the church Christ established, but we can glory in Him. "But let him that glorieth glory in this, that he understandeth and knoweth me, that I am the LORD which exercise lovingkindness, judgment, and righteousness, in the earth: for in these things I delight, saith the LORD." (Jer. 9:24) It is what God has done for us that should motivate us to praise His name.

When we experience the loving-kindness of the Lord in our service to the Lord, it is through obedience. Davd prays, "Cause me to hear thy lovingkindness in the morning; for in thee do I trust: cause me to know the way wherein I should walk; for I lift up my soul unto thee." (Psalm 143:8) We recognize, as did Davd, that God sends His chastening hand when we step out of the way of the Lord. God then hides His face for a time until we repent. This is a temporary removal of the loving-kindness of the Lord in His manifest presence which He grants when we are obedient. We cannot behold Him when he hides His face. "When he giveth quietness, who then can make trouble? and when he hideth his face, who then can behold him? whether it be done against a nation, or against a man only:" (Job 34:29) May we not lose that manifest lovng-kindness!

Even though we are disobedient, the Lord still maintains that loving-kindness that drew us to Him from our sinful state. "If his children forsake my law, and walk not in my judgments; If they break my statutes, and keep not my commandments; Then will I visit their transgression with the rod, and their iniquity with stripes. Nevertheless my lovingkindness will I not utterly take from him, nor suffer my faithfulness to fail." (Psalm 89:30-33) God is faithful to continue that good work in us until the day of coming of the Lord Jesus.

Job was one who trusted in God because of the loving-kindness of the Lord. He knew, however, that God could withdraw his presence whether it was against him personally or a nation which we have observed already in this article. (Job 34:29) The Lord crowns us with loving-kindness. Should we not take that crown and give Him glory by trusting under the shadow of His wings? The shadow that gives us relief from the burning rays of this old world. The shadow that is revealed in the New Testament as the Lord Jesus Christ. The wings that carry us from the depths of despair to the joys on the mountaintop. God indeed often remembers that we are but dust and does not utterly stir up His full wrath against us as he would be justified in doing. His kindness and compassion is real and we desire that manifest presence, but we can't walk in worldly ways to enjoy this loving-kindness.

"FORBID THEM NOT"

We have sometimes heard people say that certain ones are too young to join the church: that children have not sufficient judgment to make a profession which involves so much, and for that reason they should wait until they are older. To this we would say that people never become old enough to make a profession of faith unless they have faith, and that God does not work in His children "to will and to do of His own good pleasure" before they are old enough.

In II Chron. 4 we are told that King Josiah, at the tender age of seventeen years, began to seek after the God of David his father, and four years later he began to destroy idols which filled Jerusalem and Judah. He "declined neither to the right hand nor to the left." He was old enough because the Lord led him. Jeremiah was a child when called to the prophetic office. He lived during Josiah's reign. Samuel, when very young, was established to be a prophet of the Lord, and all Israel knew that he had been called.

Surely, when God softens the hearts of children and fills them with eagerness to attend religious services and a desire to be baptized, they are not too young to follow the Saviour.

Many times have we listened to many young people relate their spiritual exercises in such a way as to bring tears of joy to the eyes of older saints. At such times we never heard any objections to the youthfulness of the applicant. Are such too young to be added to the church?

But some will say that there are many temptations and sins surrounding the young that a public profession should be deferred until later years. Would such a course make temptations less or more easy to be overcome? If old people would make no mistakes and were not subject to trials, there might be a little argument in such reasoning. The old brethren are themselves in constant need of the Saviour.

The greater number of God's people are convicted in youth. We often hear them tell how the Lord made them abhor themselves and pray to him for mercy long before they have related the same to others.

We desire to say a few things about our first convictions. We cannot tell how old we were at the time of our first soul trouble, but we will never forget the day when we attended a funeral and asked over and over, "What will become of us at death?" That earnest question, with some alteration, troubled us for many years. At the age of 17 our convictions were more pungent. After a while peace came, and the next was an earnest desire to be baptized in Jesus' name. It often occurs to us that God has been very near us, protecting and upholding.

Should this be read by any boy or girl who desires to be baptized, our advice would be to go to the church and tell the dear saints what the Lord in great mercy has done and follow Him into the watery grave. Let us abound unto every good work, following the Lord in the way of righteousness, and He will be pleased with us.

I Peter 2:24: "Who his (Jesus) own self bare our sins in his own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: by whose stripes ye were healed."

All of our sins were laid upon the Lord Jesus Christ, who did no sin. We notice in the above scripture that he bore them in his own body. ********* FATHER'S DAY

Our earthly fathers love their children and do their best to provide, but they sometimes make mistakes. Our Heavenly Father makes no mistakes. Jesus did teach that if a son asked bread from his father, would he give him a stone? If he asked for a fish, would he give him a serpent? (Matt. 7:9-10) The obvious answer is no, he would give that which is needed if at all possible. Then Jesus paints a contrast with our Heavenly Father. "Take heed, brethren, lest there be in any of you an evil heart of unbelief." There is the "fearful heart," Isaiah said, "Say to them that are of a fearful heart, be strong." There are thousands of others who when they see those who have loving hearts for others, judge that they must be God's kinfolks—His own children. There is no use in claiming kinship with Jesus and manifest a hard and unfeeling heart. We must be ready to weep with those that weep, and forgiving and tender even to the erring, for has not God been tender with the erring if He has forgiven us for Christ's sake? So, let us take to heart the exhortation of Paul, "But exhort one another daily while it is called today, lest any of you be hardened through the deceitfulness of sin." Satan deceives us many times into hardness of heart, and we manifest coldness towards others, which tends to separate us and breaks down tenderness and fellowship, So, "today if ye will hear His voice, harden not your hearts."--Selected

THE IMPORTANCE OF HONESTY By Elder Lonnie Mozingo Jr.



In Proverbs 12:22 Solomon says, "Lying lips are abomination to the LORD: but they that deal truly are his delight." On the surface this verse seems to state an obvious truth. Examined in the context of human conduct it is profound.

The world looks upon lying in various categories. We have heard of people speak of "little white lies" and humanists of "situational ethics." However, lying is in God's sight an *abomination*. No matter what the motive or the goal, lying is looked upon as a thing of disgust and abhorrence by our Lord.

Men are by their very nature liars. David informs us in Psalm 58:3, "The wicked are estranged from the womb: they go astray as soon as they be born, speaking lies." Men have little trouble lying if the consequences of telling the truth become detrimental to them. Man begins to search for excuses that will justify a lie. It is believed by some that lying is excusable as long as it is done to spare someone's feelings. Lying is thought to be acceptable if it will keep one out of trouble. Certainly, there are those who deliberately lie to gain advantage in business or finance. Misstating one's age to get a discount at a restaurant. Reinventing events to avoid liability in a traffic accident, misrepresenting one's achievements to gain favor and telling someone you like something that you really don't like in order to spare their feelings, are a few simple examples of common dishonesty.

God is just the opposite from man. He is infinitely honest. There is not in Him the least "shadow of turning". Indeed, Paul tells us in Heb. 6:18 that it is *impossible* for God to lie. For this God's people rejoice. God's absolute honesty means that His people can have absolute confidence in His promises. Paul said, "All the promises of God in him are yea, and in him Amen unto the glory of God by us". (2 Cor. 1:20) Consequently Paul could state his confidence in salvation in Titus 1:2 when he said, "In hope of eternal life, which God that cannot lie, promised before the world began." How thankful we can be that the promise upon which our hope of eternal life rests was made by a God that *cannot* lie.

To understand just how bad lying is consider its source. Jesus said to the Pharisees, "Ye are of your father the devil, and the lusts of your father ye will do. He was a murderer from the beginning, and abode not in the truth, because there is no truth in him. When he

speaketh a lie, he speaketh of his own: for he is a liar, and the father of it." (John 8:44) Lying is of the devil. He is the "father of it" from "the beginning". Remember the lie he told in the "beginning"? "And the serpent said unto the woman, Ye shall not surely die". (Gen. 3:4) From that first lie comes all the miseries and evils that fallen man has suffered since he believed the lie of Satan rather than the truth of God.

Great is the judgment of God against lying. Solomon says in Proverbs 19:9, "A false witness shall not go unpunished, and he that speaketh lies shall perish". John says in Rev. 21:27, "And there shall in no wise enter into it any thing that defileth, neither whatsoever worketh abomination, or maketh a lie: but they which are written in the Lamb's book of life." He goes on to record that liars are in the same category with the wicked in Rev. 22:15, "For without are dogs, and sorcerers, and whoremongers, and murderers, and idolaters, and whosoever loveth and maketh a lie." Finally he states in Rev. 21:8, "But the fearful, and unbelieving, and the abominable, and murderers, and whoremongers, and sorcerers, and idolaters, and all liars, shall have their part in the lake which burneth with fire and brimstone: which is the second death." Do we care to continue to believe that lying is excusable?

Conversely our text declares, "...but they that deal truly are his delight." Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life," and it is in honesty and truth that He delights. How we rejoice that our God is truth and how He rejoices when we are truthful even to our own detriment, when we see the telling of truth as a higher goal than fixing the situation we find ourselves in. How clean to the soul and refreshing to the spirit is honesty. David declares, "Blessed is the man that maketh the LORD his trust, and respecteth not the proud, nor such as turn aside to, lies". (Psalm 40:4) Paul exhorts "Wherefore putting away lying, speak every man truth with his neighbor, for we are members one of another". (Eph. 4:15)

May God bless each of us to speak the truth and deal truly. May honesty be the hallmark of all we say and do. May we ever remember the words of David in Psalm 51:6, "Behold, thou desirest truth in the inward parts."

THE HOUSE OF BREAD

Luke 2:15: "And it came to pass, as the angels were gone away from them into heaven, the shepherds said one to another, Let us now go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing which is come to pass, which the Lord hath made known unto us."

The lowly shepherds were watching their flocks by night when an angel and a heavenly host proclaimed the birth of our Savior in the nearby city of Bethlehem. They felt such a blessing to have been included in the announcement of the Savior coming in flesh and blood to redeem his children they went and thus saw the infant wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger and they greatly rejoiced. God had come in the flesh, and was dwelling among them!

Recently I was reading our verse above, and I looked up the definition of the word Bethlehem. What I found I would like to share with you, and hopefully you'll get as much a blessing as I did studying it.

The word Bethlehem means "fruitful " or house of bread. It is said that in biblical times that the slopes of Bethlehem was rich in figs .almonds, vines, and olives. Thus it became known as the place or house of bread. Food could always be found there. It is no wonder that the Lord chose this place to come among his people. Bread is sometimes used in the scripture to define food or meats. We need spiritual food just as our natural bodies require food in order to sustain physical life from day to day. In Heb 5:12-14 Paul speaks of milk and meats being symbolic of spiritual food. Milk is for babies who have not physically grown enough to eat solid foods. Which is symbolic of a person newly come to the faith, who cannot yet receive the deep teachings of God's word as opposed to someone raised up in the church and mature in understanding the deep teachings of God (eat solid food as an adult).

Our Lord was born at Bethlehem, the house of bread, symbolically showing that he is the bread of life as is said in John 6:35. Through Jesus Christ we have the inspired word of God. He is all the spiritual food our spiritual life needs. As the slopes of Bethlehem provided much food for the body, so does Christ provide spiritual food for us through his inspired word. Where is our place of bread today? I believe it is the gospel church. As Christ came though the church of the Jews at that time and declared the end of the law upon his fulfilling it Luke 16:16. He established the gospel church which we have today. Bethlehem was

known as a small place, but yet our Lord chose it as the blessed place. Micah 5:2 "But thou, Bethlehem Ephratah, though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall he come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel; whose goings forth have been from of old, from everlasting." Though it was a small city, yet it provided food for a great number. The Primitive Baptist church is small among the other churches, yet it provides more spiritual food than any of those others. I feel that the members who left behind the church were some of the most spiritually mature individuals that this world has ever seen. Just read some of the writings of our ministers of the past, and of the present era. These are gifts from God, not from a man made Seminary that just teaches what man wants you to know. These are the modern day Bethlehem where God's children can hear the preached word to sustain their spiritual life as they serve the Lord on this side of heaven.
